GUIDELINES FOR AUTHORS

Papers and Posters accepted and presented at the 5th International Conference on Stuttering will be published in the V Edition I.C.O.S 2021 Proceedings (ISBN code)

Complete manuscripts are to be sent on or before September 2024 at this email address: info@internationalconferenceonstuttering.it (object: manuscript for the Conference Proceedings)

MANUSCRIPT PREPARATION

Manuscripts should be arranged as follows:

- title
- authors and affiliation
- abstract
- text with appropriate headings and conclusion
- references
- legends and tables (with alphabetical list of all abbreviations and their expansions as a footnote).

The text portion of the manuscript should be saved using a word-processing program, such as a .doc or .rtf file format.

Tables should be created using your word processor's table function. Please, number them consecutively (with Arabic numerals) in the order of their citation in the text and provide a title for each table. Do not submit tables as images.

Manuscripts should be typed in 11-point type (font: Times New Roman) and one-and-a-half spaced throughout. Please, set the page layout with mirror margins (in Italian: "formato speculare").

Each paper maximum length is 6 pages (references included).

REFERENCES AND REFERENCE STYLE

Authors are responsible for the accuracy and completeness of their references and for their complete and accurate citation in the text.

Please ensure that every reference cited in the text is also present in the reference list (and vice versa).

In the reference list, include names and initials of all authors (if more than 6, list 3 followed by "et al"), the title, source (journal abbreviations should conform to those in Index Medicus), year, volume, issue, and expanded page ranges.

Citations in the text should follow the referencing style used by the American Psychological Association.

List: references should be arranged first alphabetically and then further sorted chronologically if necessary. More than one reference from the same author(s) in the same year must be identified by the letters 'a', 'b', 'c', etc., placed after the year of publication.

(Please, pay attention to the parts of the references which are to be written in Italic).

Examples:

Reference to a journal publication:

Van der Geer, J., Hanraads, J. A. J., & Lupton, R. A. (2010). The art of writing a scientific article. *Journal of Scientific Communications*, 163, 51–59.

Reference to a book:

Strunk, W., Jr., & White, E. B. (2000). *The elements of style*. (4th ed.). New York: Longman, (Chapter 4).

Reference to an edited book:

Grubb, M., & Neuhoff, K. (Eds.). (2006). *Emissions trading & competitiveness: Allocations, incentives and industrial competitiveness under the EU emissions trading scheme*. London: Earthscan.

Reference to a chapter in an edited book or an encyclopedia:

Mettam, G. R., & Adams, L. B. (2009). How to prepare an electronic version of your article. In B. S. Jones, & R. Z. Smith (Eds.), *Introduction to the electronic age* (pp. 281–304). New York: E-Publishing Inc. Bergmann, I. (1997). Attention deficit disorder. In *The new Encyclopedia Britannica* (Vol. 26, pp. 501-508). Chicago, IL: Encyclopedia Britannica.

Web references:

As a minimum, the full URL should be given and the date when the reference was last accessed. Any further information, if known (DOI, author names, dates, reference to a source publication, etc.), should also be given. American Psychological Association. (2008).
